## Political Landscape – House

- $\blacktriangleright$  Republican control 222 to 211 with 1 vacancy
- Tight majority = difficult to pass bills that become law
- Committee on Agriculture G.T. Thompson (R-PA) / David Scott (D-GA)
  ✓ 232 Members since the 2018 Farm Bill
- Committee Farm Bill Priorities
  - ✓ Commodity Programs
  - ✓ Conservation and Climate Change
  - ✓ Domestic Nutrition
  - ✓ Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion
- Committee on Appropriations Kay Granger (R-TX) / Rosa Delauro (D-CT)
  - ✓ Debt limit debate finalized
  - $\checkmark$  1% across the board cut should bills fail to become law
  - ✓ House remains focused on cutting spending



## **Political Landscape – Senate**

- Democratic Control 51 / 49 Senate
- Committee on Agriculture Debbie Stabenow (D-MI) / John Boozman (R-AR)
- ➤ Tight majority makes it difficult to legislate 60 vote threshold
- Senate Ag Committee
  - ✓ 25 newly elected Senators since the 2018 Farm Bill
- Committee Farm Bill Priorities
  - ✓ Commodity Programs
  - ✓ Conservation and Climate Change
  - ✓ Domestic Nutrition little if any cuts
  - ✓ Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion
- Committee on Appropriations Patty Murray (D-WA) / Susan Collins (R-ME)
  - ✓ Increasing spending above the debt limit deal
  - ✓ Creating a clash with House Conservatives/Freedom Caucus

#### Our Industry

- \$1.264 Trillion contributed to the U.S. Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2021
  5.4 percent share
- America's farms contributed \$164 Billion in 2021 up \$28 billion compared to 2019
- > 21.1 Million full and part-time jobs down 1.1 million compared to 2019

### **Debt Limit Deal**

- Debt limit deal approved
- Protects our country's full faith and credit
- Rescinds \$28 billion from previous COVID-19 funds
- Rescinds \$1.4 billion from IRS funds
- ➢ No budget caps for 2025 and beyond
- Appropriations trigger calendar year begins 1% across the board cut



## FY 2024 House Appropriations

House Committee approved the Agriculture appropriations bill

| 2023 Funding | President's | 2024 Committee | Final vs 2023 |

|              | Budget      | Funding        | Enacted       |
| \$1.521 B    | \$1.583 B   | \$1.521 B      | - 0 -         |

- FSA Salaries and Expenses held steady for FY 2024
- Includes our office closure language
- Fully funds county committee meetings
- Full House debate scheduled and postponed



## FY 2024 Senate Appropriations

Senate Committee has approved their draft bill and report

| 2023 Funding | President's | 2024 Committee | Final vs 2023 |
|--------------|-------------|----------------|---------------|
|              | Budget      | Funding        | Enacted       |
| \$1.521 B    | \$1.583 B   | \$1.536 B      | +\$15.8 M     |

- FSA Salaries and Expenses increased by \$15.8 million
- Includes our office closure language
- Fully funds county committee meetings



### Farm Bill Reauthorization

- ➢ Farm Bill expiration coming soon − September 30
- ➢ House and Senate Committees preparing for September action
- ➢ Funding needs across all titles of the bill
- Increasing reference prices for commodities
- Conservation / Climate funding across current and improved programs
- Research initiatives for 1890 Institutions



#### Farm Bill – Best Outcome

- Farm Bill expiration coming soon September 30
- House and Senate Committee approvals during September
- House bill remains bipartisan
- ➢ House and Senate floor action and passage during October or November
- $\blacktriangleright$  New bill signed by the end of 2023



#### Farm Bill – Road Blocks

- Farm Bill expiration coming soon September 30
- House and Senate Committee approvals during September
- House bill becomes partisan
  All House Dems vote no based on insufficient funding
  - ✓ All House Dems vote no based on domestic nutrition cuts
- House Freedom Caucus votes no and the bill is partisan
  - ✓ 10-25 Republicans and all Dems vote no
  - $\checkmark$  Bill doesn't cut overall funding enough
  - ✓ Bill doesn't cut nutrition enough
- February / March arrives with no resolution
- One-year extension



## NASCOE's 2023 Priorities

- Employee Pay and Retention our top priority
- September 2022 NASCOE letter calling on FSA to increase pay
- Administrator's letter dated July 2023
  - ✓ Student loan repayment program
  - ✓ PTs with one year qualify for Grade 9
  - ✓ Grade 5 CEDs promoted within six-months
  - ✓ One-year supervisory experience qualify for Grade 9
  - ✓ 6% group retention incentive for 1101 and 1105 series position
- FSA's Pay Strategy
  - ✓ 2023 compile data
  - ✓ 2024/2025 OPM to assess data by position/grade
  - ✓ 2025/2026 Rollout pay initiatives



## NASCOE's 2023 Priorities

- 2023 Farm Bill Reauthorization
  - ✓ Protect County Committee structure
  - ✓ Protect our employee's current authorities
  - ✓ Workable commodity programs
  - ✓ Livestock Forage Program
  - ✓ Adequate funding for implementation
- Federal Retirement Fairness Act (Reps Derek Kilmer and Tom Cole) / not yet introduced
  - ✓ This bill modifies the federal civilian service that is creditable service under the Federal Employees Retirement System (FERS). Currently, nondeduction service performed before January 1, 1989, is creditable under FERS so long as a deposit is made into the retirement fund to cover the period of nondeduction service. This bill allows nondeduction service performed on or after January 1, 1989, to be creditable under FERS so long as a deposit is made into the retirement fund.
- Possible action by USDA



## NASCOE's 2022 Priorities

- HR 866 Equal COLA Act (Rep Gerald Connolly / 35 Cosponsors / Oversight and Reform)
  - ✓ This legislation would improve and balance FERS retirement benefits.
- HR 82 Social Security Fairness Act (Rep Garrett Graves / 288 Cosponsors / Ways and Means)
  - ✓ This bill repeals provisions that reduce Social Security benefits for individuals who receive other benefits, such as a pension from a state or local government. The bill also eliminates the *windfall elimination provision*, which in some instances reduces Social Security benefits for individuals who also receive a pension or disability benefit from an employer that did not withhold Social Security taxes.
